Dear Friends,



## Our Mission:

**Society for Animal Health Agriculture Science and Humanity (SAHASH)** is a non-profit organization with a mission to think, promise and work together within India to achieve a lasting improvement in the quality of life of the poor. This organization is mainly engaged in Child Protection & Education, Human Rights & Humanity, Rural Development, Health Care, Women Empowerment, Environmental Conservation, Agriculture Development, Science & Technology. SAHASH is dedicated to the betterment of society; Economically, Educationally and culturally.

## Introduction:

We began in 2006 as small a organization in a village Munshiganj, Tehsil of Amethi, District :C.S.M.Nagar Uttar Pradesh (India) with a small vocational centre for women and girls. Now SAHASH has grown to be the provider of permanent supportive educational services in rural villages for children of age 2-5 years with model, charts and toys. Also provide training to farmers for self- employment in irrespective of gender and promote them to cultivate the medicinal plants. We have trained more than 1000 women/girls to overcome physical disability, unemployment, and the barriers of poverty. We provide innovative and creative solutions to help women achieve their goals through our award-winning programs and services.

## Activities:

### CELEBRATION OF NATIONAL ENVIRONMENT DAY

On 1st March 2010 the National Environment Day was celebrated on the theme “Soil pollution and its effect on Health” by campaigning and promoting the cause among villagers and youth about soil pollution. In one ‘Goshti’ Shri.Lalmani, President of the organization lectured villagers about soil pollution and its effect on health. He said soil pollution is caused by the presence of man-made chemicals or other alteration in the natural soil environment. This type of pollution typically arises from the rupture of underground storage tanks, application of pesticides, percolation of polluted surface water onto subsurface strata, oil and fuel dumping, leaching of wastes from landfills or direct discharge of industrial wastes into the soil. The most common chemicals involved are petroleum hydrocarbons, solvents, pesticides, lead and other heavy metals. The occurrence of this phenomenon has correlation with the degree of industrialization and intensity of chemical usage.

The concern over soil pollution stems primarily from health risks, from direct contact with the polluted soil, vapors from the pollutant, and from secondary pollution of water supplies from within and underlying the soil. Mapping of polluted soil sites and the the resulting cleanups are time consuming and expensive tasks, requiring extensive amounts of geology, hydrology, chemistry and computer modeling skills.

Many countries have a legal framework in these areas to identify and deal with such environmental problems. This however may well be just the tip of the iceberg with developing countries very likely to be the next generation of new soil pollution cases.

The Environmental Protection Administration believes soil pollution to be a threat to the environment, to food safety and to sustainable agriculture. According to scientists cultivated land has been polluted, with polluted water being used to irrigate fields and further fields covered or destroyed by solid waste. Tonnes of grains are polluted by heavy metals every year.

Treated sewage sludge, known in the industry as biosolids, has become controversial as a fertilizer used in the land. As it is the byproduct of sewage treatment, it generally contains contaminants such as organisms, pesticides, and heavy metals other than soil.

Polluted soil directly affects human health through direct contact with the soil or via inhalation of soil contaminants that have vaporized. Potentially greater threats are posed by the infiltration of soil pollution onto groundwater aquifers used for human consumption, sometimes in areas apparently far removed from any sources of above ground pollution.

Health consequences from exposure to soil pollution vary greatly depending on pollutant type, pathway of attack and the vulnerability of the exposed population. Chronic exposure to chromium, lead and other metals, petroleum, solvents, and many pesticide and herbicide formulations can be carcinogenic, can cause congenital disorders, and can cause other chronic health conditions. Industrial or man-made concentrations of naturally-occurring substances, such as nitrate and ammonia associated with livestock manure from agricultural operations, have also been identified as health hazards in the soil and groundwater.

Many chlorinated solvents induce liver changes, kidney changes and depression of the central nervous system. There is an entire spectrum of further health effects such as headache, nausea, fatigue, eye irritation and skin rashes for the above cited and other chemicals. At certain levels of dosages a large number of soil pollutants can cause death by exposure via direct contact, inhalation or ingestion of pollutants in groundwater polluted through the soil.

Another program was organized to improve awareness amongst the villagers in using toilets and not go outside in fields, as this increases the chance for the rise of many diseases. This program informed them on utilizing Government policies and going to the Gram Pradhan and collecting the forms and registering themselves for being provided toilet sheets from stone block and a money grant to build the pit of toilet. Also this program educated them in not using soap while bathing in and while washing clothes in rivers such as Ganga, Yamuna and others.

### **CELEBRATION OF NATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY**

On 8th March 2010, International Women's Day was celebrated as Empowering Women's Day. Starting on this day a 3 day work shop of girls training was organized with 10 SHG'S participating to learn skill sets.

### OBSERVATION OF WORLD WATER DAY

On 22nd March 2010, World Water Day was celebrated with the theme of "Save and Conserve Water" at Saraykhema Village. During the campaign program Shri.Ram Karan said in group discussion among the farmers that water is a natural resource, and we have to reduce usage of water and apply recycling of waste water for different purposes such as cleaning, manufacturing, and agricultural irrigation. A serious water crises faces us, if more sustainable ways of water are not put into place without delay. So SAHASH takes strong steps to take this awareness to villagers and focuses on promoting water consciousness, building water-harvesting structures, advocating water conservation practices and increasing access to safe drinking water. Farmers have to grow more water-efficient crops and adopt less wasteful irrigation techniques.



During this program Awadh Kumar discussing the issues with the old women about scarcity of water which she is facing in the village. SAHASH conducts water awareness among villagers about Water-saving technology for the home that includes:

- Low-flow shower heads sometimes called energy-efficient shower heads as they also use less energy,

- Low-flush toilets and composting toilets. These have a dramatic impact in the developed world, as conventional Western toilets use large volumes of water.

- Dual flush toilets created by Caroma includes two buttons or handles to flush different levels of water. Dual flush toilets use up to 67% less water than conventional toilets. Saline water (sea water) or rain water can be used for flushing toilets. Low flow taps can be used in wash basins. Also the trainees were instructed to wash clothes using water in buckets and not to use taps directly, similarly to use buckets for cleaning the floor and not to splash water while washing thereby putting the water to waste. For irrigating the fields, they were told to try using pipes and sprinklers and not using water directly, as this can save water usage.

### CELEBRATION OF WORLD HEALTH DAY

On 7th April 2010, World Health Day was celebrated by organizing a large campaign for children in schools and villagers in villages regarding “Hygienic Habits”. This campaign basically covered the villages of Deh, Sawangi, Tikermaphi, Sangrampur and Kalikan where villagers are now able to know “Washing Hands Keeps Us Healthy”. Our volunteer educated them that harmful bacteria and viruses can stick to our hands; that washing hands is the single best way to reduce the spread of infection. It should be an essential habit for everyone. Washing hands after going to the toilet, after taking a child to the toilet, after changing diapers, before eating, after feeding a child or preparing food after wiping the nose, and after caring for a sick person. Also informed them that spitting in public places spreads diseases. Spitting is a bad habit, as it makes the environment unclean. Spit contains viruses and bacteria that can spread diseases. Also informed them that covering the mouth / nose while coughing / sneezing prevents diseases. They were told to use a handkerchief while coughing or sneezing. If you don't have a handkerchief, cover your mouth and nose. This prevents the spread of airborne infections such as Flu, Tuberculosis etc.

### OBSERVATION OF ANTI-TOBACCO DAY

On 31st May 2010 Anti Tobacco Day was observed with the theme “The Effects of using TOBACCO” by organizing awareness campaign programs in Pendoria village and through this campaign SAHASH volunteers informed villagers especially females that smoking during pregnancy can lead to:

- Still birth.

- Low birth-weight babies.
- Poor academic performance in school.

Nearly 700 million or almost half of the world's children breathe air polluted by tobacco smoke particularly in the home.

SAHASH volunteers told villagers that Passive smoking is especially dangerous for babies and children.

- Increased risk of cancer and heart attack among spouses of smokers.
- Worsening of breathing problems.
- Irritation of the eyes, nose and throat.

## OBSERVATION OF WORLD LITERACY DAY

On 08th Sep 2010 World Literacy Day was celebrated on the theme “Shikshit Bano Aage Badho!”. SAHASH’s ongoing project KHEL-KHEL MAI PADHAI in Amethi at Katergaun village to educate children from ages 2 yrs to 5 yrs.

## OBJECTIVES OF KHEL-KHEL MAI PADHAI

To educate the children of villages from the age of 2 yrs to 5 yrs through toys, charts and models and to spread confidence among the villagers that their children are at the same level as children in metro cities.

## SALIENT FEATURES OF ‘KHEL-KHEL MAI PADHAI’



We educate children through different programs and cultural activities, so that they are motivated towards education. Our volunteers go to each guardian’s house to report the progress of their child. Regular meetings are organized with the guardians. We meet with Govt. & Private school teachers and provide a facility for the children who have

crossed the age of 05 years with reference to education. We organize monthly staff meetings for checking the progress of this project.

## **OUTPUTS**

- Personality development in children.
- Subject children are getting better education in comparison to other schools/centers.
- Decrease in illiteracy.
- Motivation towards education occurs in villagers.
- Children are better motivated towards education due to use of toys.
- Guardians develop regard for our organization and for our mission in society.

## **OBSERVATION OF WORLD BLIND DAY**

On 14th Oct. 2010 World Blind Day was observed by organizing a Health Awareness Campaign Program in the villages of Bhetua, Katergaon , Pendoria and Raipurfulwari. In this campaign our volunteers spread awareness among the villagers in using a balanced diet in food and that this diet be full of leafy vegetables - a rich resource of vitamin A. The Campaign went from villages to schools where our volunteers spread awareness among students about the cause of night blindness and loss of sight.

## **CELEBRATION OF INTERNATIONAL DAY OF RURAL WOMEN**

On 15th Oct. 2010 International Day of Rural Women was celebrated. This day recognizes the role of rural women, including indigenous women, in agricultural and rural development, in improving food security and eradicating rural poverty. To promote this day our volunteers started by framing women SHGs and training them, so that they can earn a place in the economy. They also elaborated upon the role of women in agriculture practices. Medicated plants can be cultivated that are now in demand by several pharmacy companies and through the same they can earn for themselves a good income.

## CELEBRATION OF FARMER'S DAY AND READ PROJECT

On 23rd Dec 2010 Farmers Day was celebrated by organizing village group discussions in the village of Katergaon regarding capacity building and the results of the ongoing project “Rural Education on Agricultural Development (READ)” through which our volunteers made farmers aware about their rights and the Government policies implemented for them. Mainly they coordinate with B.D.O. and secretary of the Gramsabha and inform them about the different varieties of seeds and fertilizers and patterns to be followed for these.



### **OBJECTIVE OF ‘READ’:**

The main objective of this program is to make farmers aware of hybrid seeds that yield high productivity.

### **SALIENT FEATURES OF ‘READ’:**

- To provide knowledge to farmers about the use of pesticides , and warn them to use these in a limited way.
- To provide knowledge to farmers in the use of fertilizers in a limited way and to use compost and manure’s in their fields so that the productivity of crops is good and they do not include harmful chemicals such as those found in vegetables.
- Cultivation of commercial crops such as vegetables, medicinal plants, peppermint plant, tulsi, banana, mushroom, rattan jyoti (a biogradable plant) and tell them about hybrid seed varieties in coordination with Agricultural Universities.
- Train farmers in patterns of agriculture through a Workshop organized in coordination with Agricultural Universities.
- Inform farmers about Agricultural insurance and also their Life insurance and in these the Govt. pays half of the money, Rs.100 & Rs.100 by the farmers themselves. When accidents occur farmers get Rs.25000 and if fatal then Rs.50,000 is paid to their dependents.

- Tell farmers to get the soil of their fields tested so that they can know what elements are in deficiency in the soil.

### **BENEFICIARIES & RESULTS:**

- ✓ Thousands of farmers have taken up individual Life insurance and also started taking Crop insurance.
- ✓ Farmers have started cultivating commercial crops but not efficiently.
- ✓ Farmers have started testing the soil of their fields and are able to know the deficiency of elements and accordingly they provide the fertilizers to gain productivity of crops.

### **DRAWBACK:**

Some farmers are still not able to test their soil and they require soil testing on the spot. So we need a mobile soil testing lab to provide the soil test on the spot for farmers in the field.

### **OBSERVATION OF NATIONAL CONSUMER DAY**

On 24th Dec 2010 National Consumers Day was celebrated with a Consumer Awareness Program and campaigns in different villages such as Saraykhema, Pendoria, Teri and Tandwa. Awareness was spread among villagers about their rights when they purchase any thing from the market. The villagers were especially alerted that while purchasing golden jewelries to make sure that are hallmarked and to take receipts from shopkeepers. Also alerted them that while purchasing utensils or any other items, to check for the ISI mark and also while purchasing salt, ghee, spices, oils & other food materials that these have the egg mark.

Also informed them that if their electricity bills, water bills, irrigation bills of canals came in without their having used it, they have a right to file an application under District Consumer Court and no fee is required for this application or a lawyer to file it. Just an application is sufficient to claim their rights and in this they can demand compensation. Under this scheme many villagers are able to know the rights and file many applications in consumer

court regarding their issues & problems they are facing from the Government offices.

## OBSERVATION OF NATIONAL YOUTH DAY

On 12th Jan 2010 National Youth Day was celebrated as the birthday of Swami Vivekananda. Our organization organized a Cricket Tournament in the village of Saraykhema where about 6 teams from different villages participated. In this Tournament the team of Semra won the final match and appreciated by being awarded a medal and certificate for their achievement.

On the same day, at Kurushetra an Essay Competition was organized in the Public School with the theme “Swami Vivekananda’s achievement and its role for youth”. Lakshmi of class 9th won the 1st prize, Mahendra of class 10th won the 2nd prize and Aarti Singh of class 8th won the 3rd prize. All students were appreciated by being awarded a medal and certificate. After distributing the prizes, Shri.Uma Shankar, Coordinator of Haryana gave a speech with the quote of Swami Vivekananda ‘Choose the highest ideal and live your life upto that. Look at the "ocean" and not at the wave’. The speaker gave the lesson to students that they should work hard to achieve their goal.

## CELEBRATION OF NATIONAL CLEANLINESS DAY

On 30th Jan 2010 National Cleanliness Day was celebrated with a campaign “Gram Swachata Abhiyan”. Gandhiji had always emphasized the need for cleanliness for a healthy living as healthy people make for a healthy nation. However, the cleanliness that Gandhiji has stressed on is not only of the body but also of the premises and the surroundings. So on this day our volunteers took an effort to raise awareness in the villages of Pendoria, Saraykhema and Thawra about the need for cleanliness among village residents and to inform them that the Ministry for Rural Development of the Government of Maharashtra has started “Sant Gadge Baba Gram Swachata Abhiyan”. Our volunteers told the villagers that we can contribute in a great way to keep our surroundings clean! Here are some tips-

- Dispose off the garbage at proper garbage collection places. Do not throw away the garbage anywhere.
- Make use of dustbins kept at public places like bus depots, railway stations, gardens etc.

- While visiting natural areas, heritage sites, make it a habit to create minimum waste and dispose off the generated waste at proper places.
- While traveling do not throw waste wrappers etc. out on the road / railway tracks. It increases the task of waste collection; instead collect and dispose the waste in dustbins.
- Try to separate waste materials at home like plastic material, glass, metal etc. that can be recycled.
- Avoid burning the garden waste, as it pollutes the environment. You can make compost from leaf litter and use it as manure for your garden.
- Do not throw wrappers and other solid waste in gutters, it may block the drains.

6. Strengthening existing SHG Federations by special pilot project with federations to develop clear perspective, improving governance and designing and delivering services to SHG members; and policy advocacy for financial support for promoting new SHG Federation strengthening existing SHGs promoted by us; up-scaling the education learning project READ and KHEL-KHEL MAI PADHAI with partner NGO's and 'strengthening livelihoods of rural poor through training and workshop and linkages' in Amethi, Kurushetra and other areas.




